Puppy vaccination protects fully

Bringing home a new puppy is an exciting time, but it also comes with important responsibilities, including ensuring your puppy receives proper vaccinations. Vaccines protect your puppy from serious and potentially fatal diseases.

Why Vaccinations Are Important

Puppies are born with some immunity from their mother, but this protection fades over the first few months of life. Vaccinations help build your puppy's own immune system to fight off dangerous diseases.

Core Vaccines for Puppies

These vaccinations are considered essential for all puppies:

Distemper: A highly contagious viral disease that affects the respiratory, gastrointestinal, and nervous systems.

Parvovirus: A severe and often fatal disease causing vomiting, bloody diarrhoea, and dehydration.

Hepatitis (Adenovirus): Affects the liver and can cause serious illness.

Rabies: A fatal viral disease that can be transmitted to humans. Required by law in many areas.

Recommended Vaccination Schedule

6-8 Weeks: First combination vaccine (DHPP - Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus, Parainfluenza)

10-12 Weeks: Second DHPP booster, Leptospirosis (first dose)

14-16 Weeks: Third DHPP booster, Leptospirosis (second dose), Rabies vaccine

12-16 Months: Annual boosters begin

Optional Vaccines

Depending on your puppy's lifestyle and risk factors, your vet may recommend:

Kennel Cough (Bordetella): Recommended for puppies attending daycare, boarding, or dog parks.

Lyme Disease: For dogs in areas where tick-borne disease is common.

What to Expect After Vaccination

Most puppies experience no side effects. Some may have:

- Mild fever or lethargy for 24-48 hours
- - Slight swelling at the injection site
- - Reduced appetite

Contact your vet if symptoms persist or worsen, or if you notice facial swelling, difficulty breathing, or severe lethargy.

Before Full Vaccination

Until your puppy completes their vaccination series (around 16 weeks), avoid:

- Dog parks and public areas frequented by other dogs
- - Contact with unvaccinated dogs
- - Areas where wildlife may have been

Urinary Tract Infections: Bacterial infections can cause inflammation and discomfort. Feline Idiopathic Cystitis: Stress-related bladder inflammation is common in cats. Urethral Blockage: Male cats are at higher risk of developing life-threatening urinary blockages. Warning Signs to Watch For If your cat displays any of these symptoms, seek veterinary attention promptly: Straining to urinate or crying while urinating- Frequent trips to the litter box with little output- Blood in the urine- Urinating outside the litter box- Excessive licking of the genital area- Loss of appetite or lethargy- Vomiting (especially with urinary blockage) Prevention Tips Help protect your cat from urinary problems with these strategies: Hydration: Encourage water intake by providing fresh water daily and considering a cat water fountain. Diet: Feed a balanced, high-quality diet. Your vet may recommend specific urinary health formulas. Litter Box Hygiene: Keep litter boxes clean and provide one box per cat plus one extra. Stress Reduction: Minimise environmental stress through routine, enrichment, and safe spaces. Regular Check-ups: Annual veterinary examinations can detect early signs of urinary issues. When to Seek Emergency Care A complete urinary blockage is a medical emergency. If your cat, especially a male cat, is straining to urinate without producing urine, appears in pain, or becomes lethargic, seek immediate veterinary care. teethHome Dental Care Tips Brushing: Daily brushing with pet-specific toothpaste is the gold standard. Start slowly and make it a positive experience with treats and praise. Dental Chews and Toys: These can help reduce plaque buildup between brushings. Look for products with the VOHC (Veterinary Oral Health Council) seal. Dental Diets: Some prescription diets are formulated to help clean teeth mechanically as your pet chews. Water Additives: Dental water additives can help reduce bacteria in your pet's mouth. Professional Dental Care Even with good home care, most pets need professional dental cleaning periodically. During a professional cleaning, your veterinarian will: Perform a thorough oral examination- Remove plaque and tartar above and below the gum line- Polish teeth to slow future buildup- Check for and address any dental problems- Take dental X-rays if needed to assess tooth rootsWhen to Schedule a Dental Check-up We recommend annual dental examinations for all pets. However, schedule a visit sooner if you notice any signs of dental problems. Early intervention can prevent pain and save teeth.
