a. Puppy & Kitten Care

Veterinary care for your puppies and kittens.

- Urine, faecal, and skin diagnostic testing.
- Referral for specialised diagnostic procedures when necessary.

[Cat Urinary Problems: Warning Signs and Prevention Tips](#)

Feline Lower Urinary Tract Disease (FLUTD) is one of the most common health issues affecting cats. Understanding the warning signs can help you seek timely veterinary care and prevent serious complications. What is FLUTD? FLUTD is a term used to describe various conditions affecting the bladder and urethra of cats. These conditions can cause significant discomfort and, in severe cases, can be life-threatening, especially in male cats who may develop urinary blockages. Common Causes Several factors can contribute to

urinary problems in cats: Urinary Stones: Mineral crystals can form in the bladder, causing irritation and blockages. Urinary Tract Infections: Bacterial infections can cause inflammation and discomfort. Feline Idiopathic Cystitis: Stress-related bladder inflammation is common in cats. Urethral Blockage: Male cats are at higher risk of developing life-threatening urinary blockages. Warning Signs to Watch For If your cat displays any of these symptoms, seek veterinary attention promptly: Straining to urinate or crying while urinating- Frequent trips to the litter box with little output- Blood in the urine- Urinating outside the litter box- Excessive licking of the genital area- Loss of appetite or lethargy- Vomiting (especially with urinary blockage)Prevention Tips Help protect your cat from urinary problems with these strategies: Hydration: Encourage water intake by providing fresh water daily and considering a cat water fountain. Diet: Feed a balanced, high-quality diet. Your vet may recommend specific urinary health formulas. Litter Box Hygiene: Keep litter boxes clean and provide one box per cat plus one extra. Stress Reduction: Minimise environmental stress through routine, enrichment, and safe spaces. Regular Check-ups: Annual veterinary examinations can detect early signs of urinary issues. When to Seek Emergency Care A complete urinary blockage is a medical emergency. If your cat, especially a male cat, is straining to urinate without producing urine, appears in pain, or becomes lethargic, seek immediate veterinary care. Our clinic provides emergency services for urgent urinary cases.

Dental disease in pets can cause: Painful infections and tooth loss- Difficulty eating and weight loss- Bacteria entering the bloodstream, affecting heart, liver, and kidneys- Chronic discomfort that affects quality of lifeSigns of Dental Problems Watch for these warning signs that your pet may need dental attention: Bad breath (halitosis)- Yellow or brown tartar buildup on teeth- Red, swollen, or bleeding gums- Difficulty chewing or dropping food- Pawing at the mouth- Excessive drooling- Reluctance to eat hard food- Loose or missing teethHome Dental Care Tips Brushing: Daily brushing with pet-specific toothpaste is the gold standard. Start slowly and make it a positive experience with treats and praise. Dental Chews and Toys: These can help reduce plaque buildup between brushings. Look for products with the VOHC (Veterinary Oral Health Council) seal. Dental Diets: Some prescription diets are formulated to help clean teeth mechanically as your pet chews. Water Additives: Dental water additives can help reduce bacteria in your pet's mouth. Professional Dental Care Even with good home care, most pets need professional dental cleaning periodically. During a professional cleaning, your veterinarian will: Perform a thorough oral examination- Remove plaque and tartar above and below the gum line- Polish teeth to slow future buildup- Check for and address any dental problems- Take dental X-rays if needed to assess tooth rootsWhen to Schedule a Dental Check-up We recommend annual dental examinations for all pets. However, schedule a visit sooner if you notice any signs of dental problems. Early intervention can prevent pain and save teeth. Your veterinarian may recommend: **Avoidance:** Identifying and removing allergens from your dog's environment or diet. **Medications:** Antihistamines, corticosteroids, or newer medications like Apoquel can provide relief from symptoms. **Immunotherapy:** Allergy shots or oral drops can help desensitise your dog to specific allergens over time. **Topical Treatments:** Medicated shampoos and sprays can soothe irritated skin. **When to See a Vet** If your dog shows persistent allergy symptoms, schedule a consultation with our veterinary team. Arthritis and joint problems cause many senior pets to develop joint stiffness and pain. Dental disease from years of wear can affect eating and overall health. Organ function changes in the kidney, liver, and heart may require dietary adjustments. Some pets may also show cognitive changes similar to dementia in humans. **Caring for Your Senior Pet** Senior pets benefit from age-appropriate diets with adjusted protein levels and joint-supporting supplements. Continue gentle, regular exercise to maintain muscle tone and joint flexibility. Provide soft bedding, easy access to food and water, and ramps if needed for mobility.
